## Accepting Your Offer

You must accept your offer in order to reserve your place at UCD. You may be required to pay a non-refundable deposit which will then be deducted from your fees. The deadline for accepting your offer will be stated in your official online offer letter.

UCD reserves the right to withdraw any offer if deemed necessary at a later stage. Further information can be found on the [UCD website](#)

## TYPES OF OFFER

### Unconditional Offer or Full Offer

An Unconditional Offer or Full Offer means that you have met all the entry requirements for the programme.

### Conditional Offer

A Conditional Offer means that you will be accepted if you meet certain entry requirements, as specified in your offer letter.







## ACCEPT A FULL OR CONDITIONAL OFFER

- Log in to your application account at [www.ucd.ie/global/apply](http://www.ucd.ie/global/apply)
- Upon logging in, you will see that your application appears with the status of 'OFFER'. Click on 'ACCEPT OR DECLINE' and it will bring you to the page where you can accept the offer, and pay the deposit, if required.
- Your acceptance will not be complete until you successfully submit your acceptance online and, where appropriate, pay the deposit.
- Upon acceptance of your offer, UCD will automatically create a student record for you. Following this, you will receive an email confirmation of your acceptance, including your student number.



## DEFER AN OFFER

## Meeting The Conditions Of Your Offer

### English language condition

All UCD programmes are taught through English, and applicants from non-English speaking countries **must** provide evidence of competence in the English language through a recognised English language test or equivalent.

The minimum English Language Requirements in relation to IELTS are an average score of 6.5 over all components with a minimum of 6.0 in each band on the Academic Version. The English Language Requirements in relation to TOEFL are: a minimum score of 90 in the Internet-based TOEFL (iBT) with no less than 21 in writing and at least 19 in every other section. For all proficiency tests, the results must be dated within two years of the programme start date. Some courses have higher English language requirements. Please make sure to check the English language requirements for your chosen programme of study.

### Academic Conditions: Undergraduate Students

If your offer is conditional upon obtaining your final high school results, the offer letter will state the level and grades required. When your results are known, please upload a certified copy of your transcripts/test reports. UCD also has [qualification check procedures](#). Any documentation not in English should be accompanied by an official English translation. Any offer will be conditional until we have received satisfactory official final transcripts.





### Academic Conditions: Masters Students

If your offer is conditional upon obtaining a degree, the offer letter will state the level and GPA required. When your degree results are known, please upload a certified copy of your transcripts/test reports. UCD also has [qualification check procedures](#). Any documentation not in English should be accompanied by an official English translation. Any offer will be conditional until we have received satisfactory original transcripts.

### Deposit

A deposit is normally payable to secure a place on most courses, please check your offer letter for details. Deposits are non-refundable. The deposit amount will be deducted from your tuition fees.

### Proof of identity

You will be required to submit either a birth certificate or passport as part of the registration process.

# FINANCIAL INFORMATION

## Programme Fees

In order to complete the registration process, you must confirm your registration and pay the appropriate fee. You can view a detailed breakdown of your fees while registering in the SIS (Student Information System) through your UCD Connect account.

### When to pay fees to UCD

Students may pay fees by trimester:

- You may pay one third of your fee in trimester one and the remainder in trimester two
- If you are on a 3-trimester programme you may pay your fee in thirds by trimester

**Note 1:** If you require a visa to study in Ireland, the Irish Government will only issue a student visa if you have paid your tuition fees in full or paid a minimum deposit to the value of €6,000 or 50% of tuition fees. Please ensure that you have paid and received a receipt to the value of the minimum visa payment requirement, so as to avoid visa refusal on the basis of incomplete tuition fee payment.

**Note 2:** Using TransferMate is the quickest method to receive a fee receipt for visa purposes.

**Note 3:** Where you are receiving funding from a third-party source, you must pay either a half or a third (whichever is applicable to the programme) of any balance of fees and charges in order to be a registered student of the university.

## How Do I Pay Fees?

You can pay directly by **credit or debit** card using UCD's online payment facility. This is available at [www.ucd.ie/sisweb](http://www.ucd.ie/sisweb). A receipt will be emailed to you at your default email address or another that you specify.







Pay via the **TransferMate** payment facility. This facility is especially useful for students who require a visa to travel and/or study. You can access this service on:

**Please ensure you enter your Student Number or Application Number as the narrative/description on the transfer so it can be identified as your payment and added to your record.**

**Third Party Payment** allows individuals and organisations to pay fees on behalf of a UCD student by debit or credit card without having access to confidential student information.

### Receipt of Payment

If you pay by bank transfer, you will need to contact UCD for receipts relating to visa applications. This may take some time; therefore we urge you to use the TransferMate option to

speed up payment and visa applications. If you pay online, you will be emailed a receipt. You may also print your own receipt for the current year.

### IMPORTANT NOTES

UCD **cannot accept cash** payments. If you pay UCD directly by International Bank Transfer it is **vital that you include your student number** or Application number as the sole reference. Our Student Payments team can be contacted via the Student Desk Connector at [www.ucd.ie/students](http://www.ucd.ie/students). Please quote your UCD application / student number, payment amount, and payment reference.

The UCD Fees office does not issue invoices for the purposes of paying fees. If you are in receipt of private sponsorship you are liable for ensuring your fees are paid correctly. ### Cost of Living

The table of costs on this page gives a rough guide to the cost of living in Dublin over the course of one month. These costs are a guideline only and can vary greatly from student to student. The lowest estimate assumes you are living on campus and excludes and unforeseen expenses. UCD does not recommend that students budget according to the lowest estimate.

This table is based on 2024 costs and is intended to help you plan your budget for living expenses such as accommodation, food and other basics. Lots of things can affect how much you'll need so it's important to consider your own spending habits, conduct your own research and remember that these numbers are indicative only and do not account for inflation or other factors which might impact the cost of living.

This guideline does not include programme fees, the cost of flights, or insurance. You should also budget for any once-off and initial costs you will

likely incur (e.g. you might need to buy a new laptop for your studies or budget for short-term accommodation upon arrival in Dublin)

It's also important to bear in mind that all non-Irish nationals, who are non EU/EEA, Swiss or UK nationals, **must** register in person with the Irish Immigration Service Delivery (ISD) after arrival and after completion of registration at UCD. ISD will issue you with a residence permit/card. As of June 2023, the fee for this card is €300 and should be included in your budgeting calculations.

All non-EU/EEA students are required to hold health insurance. This can range from €135 to €680 per year, depending on your age and the duration of your course and should also be included in your budgeting calculations.

## Living and Working in Ireland

### Entitlement to work (casual employment)

Students who are attending a full-time course of at least one year's duration are entitled to seek employment on a casual basis. Non-EU students on a Stamp 2 are permitted to work up to 20 hours a week during term time, and up to 40 hours a week during breaks: June to September, and 15 December to 15 January. International students can also apply for the prestigious Global Excellence Scholarship for outstanding students from diverse backgrounds. UCD recognises previous exchange and Study Abroad students through the UCD Past Exchange / Study Abroad Scholarship. Graduates from a Universitas 21 member university may also be eligible for the Universitas 21 Alumni Scholarship.

**Stayback Visa: Third Level Graduate Scheme**



Ireland's Third Level Graduate Scheme is a 'stayback visa' that allows international students to remain in Ireland and look for a job after they graduate.

International students (non-EU/EEA) who have graduated from Irish higher education institutions can stay in Ireland for 12 months to seek employment after graduating from an undergraduate degree, or for 24 months if students are awarded a postgraduate degree.

Students are eligible for the scheme if they have a Bachelor, Master or PhD degree. If you have graduated from UCD you can avail of this scheme. Employers can hire graduates who are eligible to work for up to 40 hours per week. You must have a valid Stamp 2 to apply online for the Third Level Graduate Programme and be issued with a new IRP card indicating you are a Stamp 1G holder. You must:

- Provide a copy of your examination results which you can download via SIS Web
- Have a valid passport
- Have your Irish Residence Permit Card
- Pay €300 by credit/debit card
- Have Private Medical Insurance for a period of 12 months

# ACCOMMODATION

**UCD has a vibrant student community living on campus. Over 4,000 students live in the state-of-the-art student accommodation, just 5 kilometres from Dublin city centre.**

UCD Residences provides accommodation for students in a mix of apartments, halls and catered accommodation, and all UCD accommodation is single-room and apartment-style. Accommodation rates are published online and can be found at:

## How to Apply?

There is a high demand for our on-campus accommodation. If you wish to live on campus, we highly recommend that you apply as soon as possible. Students are required to have accepted their course offer and paid the deposit in order to book on-campus accommodation (subject to availability). Students with a conditional accept for their course are eligible to book a room. Students will be contacted by email about on-campus booking processes and invited to make an application via the Residences Portal.





If you are allocated a place in the on-campus accommodation, you will be sent an email with instructions on how to proceed.

All students must accept their accommodation offer within 72 hours, it is therefore vital to check your emails regularly. We expect all rooms to be filled quickly due to the large demand.

# STUDENT VISA INFORMATION

## Do I Need a Visa?

Some students from outside the EU/EEA require an entry visa for Ireland. You can check the Immigration Service Delivery (ISD) website at: [www.inis.gov.ie](http://www.inis.gov.ie) to see if you require a visa.

You must make your visa application online using the AVATS online facility. Completing the online application form is the first step. The application will only be processed when the online form is completed and the required documentation, passport photograph and appropriate fee are received by the relevant office as indicated by the online system. If you are a student from China, India, Nigeria, Russia, the United Arab Emirates or the United Kingdom, please also check the Irish Embassy website for details of further documentation which may be required.

You should read the visa application details very carefully. If you do not provide the documentation required, your visa will be refused.

## Checking on Your Visa Status

You should apply as early as possible for your visa as it can take eight to twelve weeks to process. You can check online at [www.irishimmigration.ie/visa-decisions/](http://www.irishimmigration.ie/visa-decisions/) to see if your visa has been processed

(using your Visa Application Number). This list is updated weekly.

If you get approval for a visa, the Embassy to which you sent your documents will affix a visa to your passport.

If you are refused a visa, you may appeal the decision within two months. However, as this would affect your date of arrival in UCD, you would need to seek advice on final acceptable arrival date from the course director/administrator.





## Immigration Service Delivery Registration

All students from outside the EU/EEA, after they have registered with UCD, must register with ISD in order to obtain permission to remain in Ireland. ISD registration must take place before the expiry date stamped on their passport by immigration officials at the airport. Even if you do not require a visa to enter Ireland, you are required to register with ISD after arrival. Further information on registration will be provided at orientation.

**Important note:** When you have applied for your visa, please alert us by updating your profile on the Incoming Student Portal. The Incoming Student Portal is available on your SISWEB account. **Please apply for your visa as early as possible.**

## Health Insurance

Non-EU students must obtain private health insurance. You can purchase insurance in your home country, however you will need to ensure that it is valid in Ireland and in any other countries you plan to travel to. There are different levels of private health insurance available.

Students are advised to read their policy documents carefully. ISD requires that, if you have health insurance from your own country it must cover you up to €25,000 for in-hospital treatment.

UCD Global has a dedicated group scheme for non-EU/EEA with Vhi Healthcare, Ireland's largest Health Insurance provider. This scheme is available to students enrolled on an academic course of one year or more. It offers a discounted rate and concessions on the standard waiting periods that must be served when joining a health insurance plan. This means that UCD students will have immediate cover for all new and pre-existing conditions. Please read through the policy wording and prices via the links below. This policy is accepted for immigration purposes.

# REGISTRATION

Once you accept an offer the next step is registration. You will need to register online before you can begin your studies at UCD. Registration allows you to obtain your UCD Student Card (UCARD) and gain access to the wide range of facilities available to our students.

Registration for the majority of programmes takes place in August and you will receive notification via email when registration opens.

Registration will be available through UCD Connect at [www.ucd.ie/connect](http://www.ucd.ie/connect). Please note that your UCD Connect account will be available 48 hours in advance of online registration - access is not available immediately. **Your username is your UCD student number, and your password is your date of birth (in ddmmmy format).** You will also receive your official UCD student email address.

In UCD Connect, click on the "Student Life" tab, then enter the SIS (Student Information System). If you were a student of UCD in the last three years, your account and email details remain the same. If you have any questions or problems

## CAMPUSES

### Belfield campus

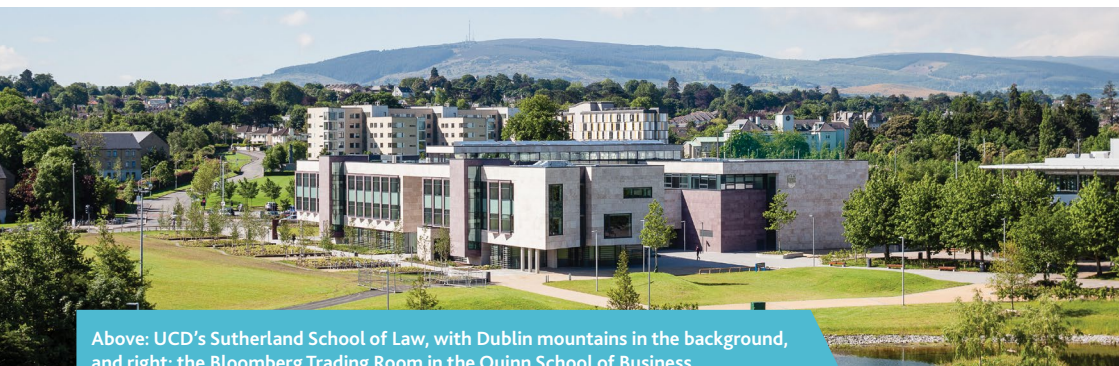
The main campus of UCD is situated at Belfield, a 133 hectare site 5km south of the centre of Dublin city. Facilities include vaults of historical record, the biggest animal hospital in Ireland (and animal A&E for Dublin), world-class teaching and research facilities, excellent accommodation, a huge sports centre with Olympic-size swimming pool, and interactive laboratories, some of which are unique to UCD.

With such a large campus, we have the ability to house an incredible breadth of amenities (such as the UNESCO-recognised National Folklore Collection), all of which make the UCD experience unique.

There is also an 8km woodland walk around campus where students love to walk, run and relax surrounded by nature.

### Blackrock campus

The UCD Michael Smurfit Graduate Business School is located at the Blackrock campus, approximately 3km from Belfield. The campus is within walking distance of the thriving seaside town of Blackrock, one of the prime residential and shopping areas of suburban Dublin, which is linked by light rail and bus services to the city. The Blackrock campus is connected to the Belfield campus by a scheduled bus service.

At UCD, our faculty and staff are focused on ensuring that all students have the best experience and receive the best education possible in an exciting, dynamic and supportive environment.

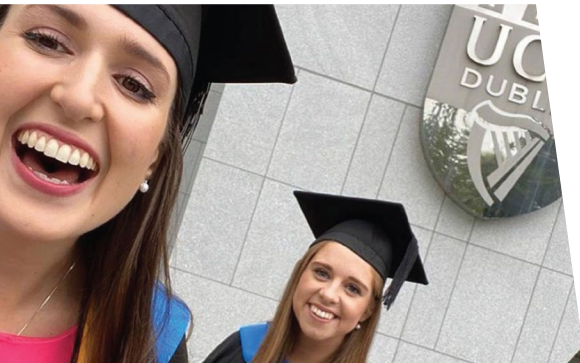

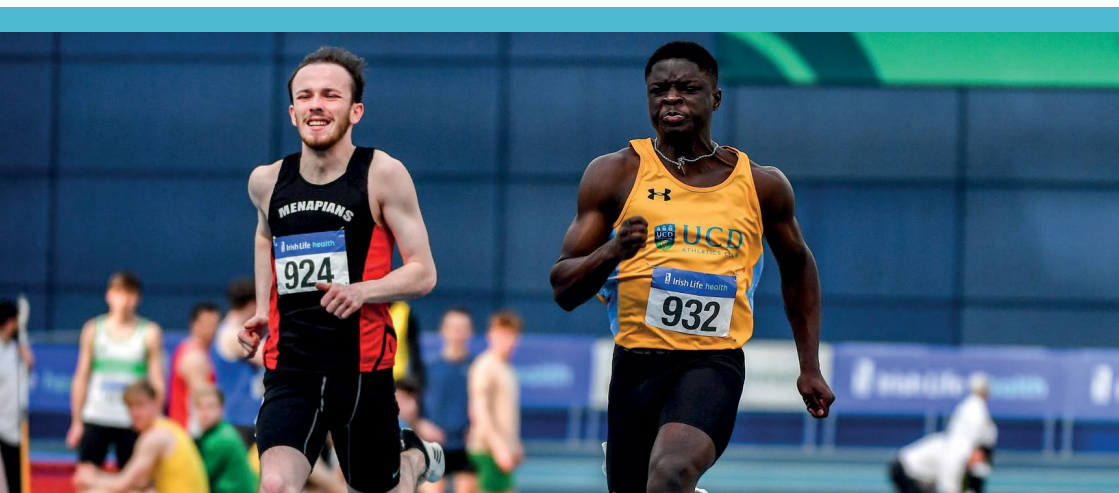
hockey pitch, synthetic rugby, GAA and football pitches and the National Hockey Stadium.

Ireland is known as the **internet and games capital** of Europe and is home to the top five global software companies, nine of the top ten US tech companies, all of the top three global security and global enterprise software companies, four of the top five IT services companies and all ten of the top 'born on the internet' companies.

## MED TECH AND PHARMA

Ireland is home to **all of the top ten global pharma companies** and has over 30,000 people employed in the industry. Over €10 billion has been invested in new biological production in the last decade. Ireland has exported almost €73 billion in biopharmaceutical product. The medical technology sector in Ireland is recognised as one of the five global emerging hubs. The sector employs over 40,000 people in Ireland and is the second largest employer of medtech professionals in Europe, per capita. Ireland is one of the largest exporter of medical products in Europe with annual exports of €12.6 billion and companies here directly export to over 100 countries worldwide.

## ENGINEERING

The **Engineering industry in Ireland is strong and vibrant**. It supports a very broad range of companies in various fields, including environmental, biomedical, aerospace, energy, ICT and medical devices to name but a few. The industry is also a very strong contributor to Irish exports generating €5 billion in exports annually.

The **manufacture of food and drink is Ireland's most important indigenous industry**, with over €13 billion of product exported every year to 180 markets worldwide. ### Discover Ireland

From your base in Dublin, the whole island of Ireland is readily accessible. Hire a car, or take a bus or train, and explore one of the most beautiful countries in the world. Visit Planet Ahch-To from Star Wars (Skellig Michael, Co. Kerry), experience the majestic Wild Atlantic Way (maybe try surfing!), and visit places like Galway, Cork, Kilkenny and the Aran Islands.

# Transport Links

The Belfield campus is located 5km from Dublin city centre on the N11. With thousands of students and staff attending the University every day, there are many travel options from the various parts of the city, and indeed the whole country. Many bus routes service Belfield, taking you to and from the city, local suburbs and beyond. High quality, frequent bus services also serve the Clonskeagh side of campus.

The local DART station, at Sydney Parade, is within walking distance. It will take you north to Howth via the city centre and south to Greystones via Blackrock and Bray. A shuttle bus service between UCD and Sydney Parade DART Station operates during term time between the hours of 8am to 10am, and from 4pm to 6pm.

The DART interconnects with the Red Luas line at Connolly Station/Busaras, which in turn connects with Heuston Station. The 145 Dublin Bus Route also offers a direct bus service from UCD to Heuston Station. The Green Luas line, at Windy Arbour and Milltown, is also within walking distance.
