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1 - Background

Coming out of the unprecedented worldwide pandemic, a transformed landscape of Irish higher education is slowly emerging. The UCD Centre for Japanese Studies (JaSt) was established in April 2020 to develop innovative ways of bringing students, academics, industry and policymakers together to 'Rise to the Future' (UCD Strategy, 2020-2024), building on a significant track record of research in the area. In the middle of the current global geopolitical transformation, the Government Strategy, "Global Ireland: Delivering in the Asia Pacific region to 2025" (Jan 2020) emphasises Ireland's need to prepare experts/leaders with advanced knowledge and experience from across Asia to deepen and expand international relations. JaSt will be a natural focus to leverage funding and other forms of support from national/international organisations raising UCD's profile in this important area.

Japan is a strong 'pivot' to Asia, a crucial region identified in UCD's Global Engagement Strategy. It is the 3rd largest economy in the world and has a highly developed STEM sector, stable democracy and longstanding links with other large economies (e.g. USA, EU). ICT, education and agri-food were among the five sectors identified for bilateral trade in Partnership for Innovation and Growth 2013.

As Ireland's global National University, such an offering is opportune and strategic. It is often remarked (by internal/external stakeholders, e.g. Japan Foundation) that UCD has suffered for not having a 'core base' for Japanese Studies. JaSt will deal with this gap by offering (as exists elsewhere, for example, at UC Berkeley in America and East Anglia in England) an innovative interdisciplinary research-driven model, supporting research into a unique culture and society. JaSt will enable UCD to fulfil its ambitions to increase and diversify its student/staff population through broader and deeper engagement with many Asian countries in critical areas of research, intercultural competence and employment. The Centre will provide one focus for the Asia-Pacific Research Network and will operate alongside other academic centres and institutes dedicated to English-speaking countries and China.

2 - Centre members & governance

JaSt is affiliated with the School of Social Policy, Social Work and Social Justice (SPWJ) and the College of Social Sciences and Law (CoSSL). The Director will report directly to the Head of School (SPWJ) and the College Principal (CoSSL), working closely with SPWJ's research and finance managers. The Director and Deputy Director will establish manageable goals that will be consistently reviewed, and together with the members of the Centre, they will oversee academic standards and the coherence of the research and related programmes.

Key research in the broad area of Japanese Studies comes from members in History; Languages, Cultures and Linguistics; Mathematics and Statistics; the Applied Language Centre; Nursing, Midwifery and Health Systems; and Social Policy, Social Work and Social Justice.



3.2 - Commendation

Japanese Honours for UCD Historian

Over the past 25 years, UCD is the only Irish third-level institution to offer Japanese History at primary and postgraduate levels, pioneered by Dr Declan Downey, UCD School of History. In recognition of his work, as well as of his outstanding contribution to the promotion of mutual understanding between Japan and Ireland, Dr Downey was awarded the Japanese Foreign Minister's Commendation on 1 December 2020.

He is amongst 172 individuals and 65 groups worldwide to be so honoured. He served as an advisor to the Asian Strategy Committee, Department of the Taoiseach from 1998-2005 and as a trustee of Chester Beatty Library from 2012-2017. As a leading researcher in Japanese studies in Ireland, Dr Downey has played an important role in fostering young researchers in the field, many of whom have availed of postgraduate scholarships and research fellowships awarded by the Japan Foundation and by the Japanese Government.

As Dr Downey commented: "Over the last ten years, I have been fortunate to be joined by Dr Naonori Kodate, Ambassador Emeritus John Neary, Dr Emma Sokell, Mr Hugo O'Donnell and Ms Nobuko Ijichi-O'Donnell in



developing the interdisciplinary Japanese Studies Programme in the University. Since 1995, when the late Professor Ronan Fanning asked me to teach Japanese History, which he called "the exotic course", I have been privileged to have the full support of the Embassy of Japan, of the Japan Foundation, of my colleagues and good friends in UCD and in Chester Beatty Library, particularly the late Professor Satoshi Ushioda and the late Dr Tom Hardiman. This official recognition of my small contribution to the reputation and profile of UCD School of History and of UCD Japan Studies Group, is greatly appreciated".

3.3 - Japanese Language and Culture Modules [2009-2021]


Japanese is a long-established curricular language (first non-European language in Irish secondary schools) and a 'targeted' language in the Irish Government's ambitious 'Languages Connect Strategy, 2017-26'). It is also a highly sought-after language by increasing numbers of International (EU and non-EU) students in UCD. It has been offered in UCD for more than 30 years.

However, as figures show, from a high point in 2010/11, student numbers are in decline (248 down to 158 this year). These are small numbers for a university of UCD's size. Proficiency targets are also low, beginners A.1.1. competence, not the Government B1 'independent user' target); few students continue 'up the levels'. Yet pent-up student demand is high. When in 2018/19, +60 registered Japanese students, had their class places suddenly cancelled, the UCD Japanese Students' Society (506 members), stepped up to offer free Japanese classes to disappointed students.


Research shows that Japanese (like other non-European languages) poses particular learning challenges for students. Additional learning time and specific pedagogies are required, the complex writing system is challenging, and cultural-specific awareness is essential to progression.

The UCD Horizons 'Free Electives' structure was cut back following UCD Curriculum Review and Enhancement (CRE) but is still the dominant ALC teaching model/framework. It supports a generic, common approach to foreign language teaching, as shown on their website, and most modules are taught at beginners/entry-level. The decline in numbers presents an opportunity to reimagine Japanese (in particular) language education.

Encouragingly and on a constructive note, it is clear that UCD's Global Engagement Strategy, a major strand within "Rising to the Future", is signalling new thinking and a new direction. It seeks to open up ambitious opportunities to support foreign language learning (incl. non-European languages such as Japanese) and move beyond current barriers to extending language learning options. These will be referenced in the final section.

3.6 - UCD Japanese Society 2020-21

The UCD Japanese Society was founded in 2010 by students of UCD arising from volunteer work they did for the Annual Experience Japan Festival. The society is wholly student-run and has a committee that meets regularly which organises all events. In 2018-19 they won the 'UCD Small Society of the Year' award.

At the start of the academic year, with the pandemic disrupting society activities, a Discord Server was set up from scratch by the society with elements integrated to encourage member interaction. A key aspect of Discord was the voice calls that happen daily on the server; throughout the year there are always people available for calls to support each other. Another successful element is an integrated bot that automatically uploads posts from the JSoc Twitter account onto the server, so all are informed of events. There are many features of the system but a popular section has been the "Study Zone" which is being used by members to focus on programme work where members help each other on different topics related to their studies.



The whole system was very well received by all but particularly by new 1st Year student members. It gave them access to information and connections otherwise difficult to source given Covid-19 restrictions and reduced access to the Belfield Campus. Over the last year, +40,000 messages were exchanged by society members on the Discord Server.

With the Discord Server supporting society activities and using Zoom, the society had approximately 5 events each week. In all +145 official events were held in 2020-21. These included 12 film screenings, Games nights (including Shogi), a Book Club, JSoc Gym Sessions (guided training sessions), Ochatto (Japanese speaking only tea afternoons), East-Asia Week (collaboration with other East-Asian societies) and Hallowe'en Week with both Irish and Japanese ghost stories and urban legends (including a screening of the Japanese horror movie 'Ringu'). There were 37 collaborations with other societies and 10 quiz and games nights organised. The society also organised 19 beginner Japanese classes and additional support sessions for advanced language level members.

A highlight this year was the many different sessions organised through the UCD Centre for Japan Studies with students from Meiji and Tsuda Universities and in particular the language exchange with International Christian University students (*'Language Buddies'* Program). Over the year, membership climbed to 506 for 2020-21 which was the most successful year for the society to date.



4 - Events

4.1 - UCD Japan Fair 2020

To mark the 5th year of the Annual UCD Japan Fair, the UCD Japan Group and the JaSt held five webinars, in collaboration with the UCD Japanese Society, Experience Japan, the Embassy of Japan in Ireland and the Ireland-Japan Association. Speakers joined us from Japan, Ireland, the USA and the UK.



4.2 - The 'PARA Beats' online symposium & concert [February 2021]



Japan's Hiro Hayashida [Samurai Music ZI-PANG] and Ireland's Donal Lunny [joined by Cora Venus Lunny (violin), James Mahon (uilleann piper) and Robbie Walsh (bodhrán)] composed a piece of music to mark the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games featuring elements of both nations' rich musical culture highlighting inclusion through Music and Sport. The historic collaboration was unveiled at the virtual 'ParaBeats' Event hosted live online from Narita City on Thursday, 11th February 2021. The project was initiated and led by Experience Japan Taiko and its director Nobuko Ijichi who mediated the links between the Irish and Japanese musical and cultural communities.

The project linked with Cara-Sport Inclusion Ireland, Paralympics Ireland and Narita City along with the Department of Foreign Affairs and the Embassy of Ireland in Japan.

7.1 - Japanese Studies - language/culture/society [incl. Business, STEM, Arts & others]

UCD's Global Engagement Strategy, a major strand within 'Rising to the Future', commits to new initiatives and implementation models to strengthen competences in global civilisations, languages and a range of societal challenges. An aim is to develop competence to speak, understand and think in foreign languages thereby providing 'A Global Experience for All'. The approach will draw on UCD's new Strategy and the Government's National Strategy for Foreign Languages in Education 2017-2026, which is proving to be a transformational initiative in Irish HEIs. In UCD, implementation will include embedding the development of foreign language learning in university Programmes and Curricula, supporting Study/Research Abroad opportunities for students and a range of other initiatives. In particular, we aim to provide our students with greater opportunities to be able to conduct research in Japan/Asia and obtain strategic and leadership positions in businesses and diplomacy.

From a Japanese language point of view, this will involve

- exploring models of research-led Japanese T/L for diverse learner categories (incl. STEM, Business, others)
- benchmarking of standards and test outputs to international standards (certification)
- exploring how digitization can overcome barriers to language learning and international exchange
- creating collaborative strategic partnerships, nationally internationally
- developing models of creative, participatory and experiential models of language learning

Already, research has commenced in sourcing models and information and setting up partnerships from other countries' examples - Japanese language/culture teaching (e.g. Aarhus, Barcelona, Cambridge, East Anglia, Leiden, Michigan, Monash, Portland State, Ruhr-Bochum and Singapore.)

7.2 - Continuing Professional Development

We will set up a Working Group with academics and practitioners with relevant expertise in this area.

- We will provide our students with greater opportunities to be able to conduct research in Japan/Asia and obtain jobs in businesses and diplomacy.

8 - Conclusion

Good start, more envisaged.

Despite the pandemic, which severely impacted networking opportunities, we have achieved a great amount in the first year. We will seek to continue to leverage these in particular in relation to personnel (researchers in the area of Japanese Studies) and continue with promoting Japan among the UCD community, with a particular emphasis on Japanese language course which aligns with UCD Strategies for the coming year.

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
