# UCD School of Public Health, Physiotherapy and Sports Science awarded Athena Swan Silver Award

The UCD School of Public Health, Physiotherapy and Sports Science was awarded the prestigious Athena Swan Silver Award following a successful review by the Athena Swan Ireland panel in September.

Professor Akke Vellinga, who led the review process at the School, said, "This award is an important recognition of our School's ongoing commitment to advancing equality, supporting staff and students, and fostering an inclusive and equitable environment". The award was achieved following an evidence-based review of progress and impacts made against the School's Action Plan developed in 2021, when the School was awarded the Athena Swan Bronze Award.



Commenting on the Award, Head of School Associate Professor James Matthews said, "It reflects the hard work, dedication and collaboration of so many people across our School and we want to extend our sincere thanks to everyone who contributed to this achievement".

The School will continue to build on its Action Plan and embed good practice into all that it does with a focus on a number of key priority areas.

The School is now one of seven schools in UCD to have achieved a departmental Silver Athena Swan Award. University College Dublin achieved the institutional Silver Athena Swan Award in September 2024.


Healthy Eating Active Living Week Nov 10th- 14th

# Lunchtime Lecture Nov 12<sup>th</sup>: Exploring the Links between Phthalates, PFAs and Breast Cancer





About the Talk: Exploring Links Between Phthalates, PFAS and Breast Cancer

Scientists and the public are increasingly concerned about environmental chemicals and their potential impact on breast cancer risk. In this talk, Professor Reeves will share her research examining two ubiquitous environmental chemical groups—phthalates and perfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS)—and their potential connections to breast cancer development. A key focus of her presentation will be to describe and address the unique challenges epidemiologists face when investigating causal relationships in this complex area.

### Invitation: Special Lecture on Human Biomonitoring Nov 13th



The Occupational Hygiene Society of Ireland, of which Dr Alison Connolly is the vice-President, is hosting the Eustace Lecture. This year, Dr Holger M. Koch, an external lecturer for the UCD Centre for Safety and Health at Work and collaborator of Dr Connolly's research team, will present the keynote lecture at St James's Hospital on November 13th, 2025, from 6:30pm to 7:30pm.

Dr Koch is the Division Head for Human Biomonitoring at the Institute for Prevention and Occupational Medicine in Bochum, Germany. He has authored over 250 peer-reviewed publications on the exposure and risk assessment of occupational and environmental chemicals, including plasticisers, bisphenols, parabens, UV filters, and pesticides, and has a Hindex of 74 and an i10-index of 208. Dr Koch is an Honorary Professor at The University of Queensland, Australia.

Dr Koch will be delivering a presentation on 'Using Human Biomonitoring as an Early Warning System: A Case Study of Di-n-Hexyl Phthalate Exposure Caused by a Contaminated UV Filter in Sunscreens'. Tickets are free, but you must reserve them <a href="here">here</a>.

### **HSE QUIT Programme**

Healthy UCD, in partnership with the HSE and UCD Student Health, are delighted to continue delivering the Free HSE QUIT Programme on the Belfield Campus from September 2025. The programme is open to ALL on campus - students and staff - and is being delivered in the UCD Village for the whole academic year.

One-to-one appointments are offered with the HSE Stop Smoking Advisor, and free nicotine replacement therapy (NRT) is provided. The Stop Smoking Advisor helps the person to make a QUIT plan and together they can discuss current smoking habits, concerns about quitting and advice on how to cope with cravings and withdrawal. People also have the opportunity to test their carbon monoxide levels at each appointment to track their progress.

### **STOP@Home Success**







The STOP@Home project is a pioneering, technology-enabled care model designed to support 95 older individuals living at home, including 25 recently discharged from acute hospitals and 70 awaiting Home Support Services to help them live independently, safely, and with dignity. STOP@Home is built around three key pillars: Safety, Social Connection, and Wellness.

The UCD School of Public Health, Physiotherapy and Sports Science is providing the HSE with an independent evaluation of the project. STOP@Home was recently short-listed for the 2025 Irish Healthcare and HSE Excellence awards.

The SPHPSS senior research scientist evaluating the STOP@Home project, Laura Rice, also presented two posters on the project at the HSE Integrated Care Conference on September 4th.



# Accelerating Progress on the SDGs through Research, Innovation and Partnerships: Taighde Éireann - Research Ireland Event





### PhD Student Poster Presentation at EUROTOX 2025

Darragh Doherty is a PhD student based in the Centre for Safety and Health at Work in the SPHPSS, working under the supervision of Dr Alison Connolly. Darragh presented a poster detailing his research as part of the EIRE research project at the EUROTOX 2025 conference, which took place in Athens from 14-17 September.

Darragh's research involves analysing exposures to neonicotinoid insecticides (NNIs) among the Irish population. NNIs are a class of pesticides that target and kill harmful insects and are used as plant protection products and as flea treatments for pets. As part of the EIRE research project, urine samples from the general Irish population were analysed for different NNIs and widespread exposure to NNIs was shown.

In addition, pet owners who use flea treatments containing imidacloprid, which is an NNI, have slightly elevated levels of imidacloprid compared to the general population. Importantly, all levels of NNIs quantified in this research were well below the Acceptable Daily Intake, an EU guidance value detailing the amount of a pesticide that can be consumed daily with no appreciable health risk. Therefore, based on current guidelines, Irish people are protected from adverse health outcomes due to NNI exposures.

### **UCD Volunteer Overseas (UCDVO) Recognition Evening**



On Friday 3rd October, many parents, loved ones, students and staff braved Storm Amy to gather in the Sutherland Law Building to see UCDVO students graduate from this year's UCDVO programme. Many of the students were drawn from SPHPSS programmes including Physiotherapy, Clinical Nutrition & Dietetics, and Sport Management. It was a wonderful evening where we heard, via video, from partners in Uganda (Nurture Africa, Kisiizi Hospital, Uganda GAA, ECO Brixs), Tanzania (Holy Union Sisters Health, Holy Union Sisters Education), and Cambodia (MOEI 1 and 2) about the amazing work that UCD students had accomplished during their time working with UCDVO and the contribution the projects made to their communities.

Student representatives from each project also delivered a presentation highlighting what their project entailed while describing what they experienced and the contribution they made during their projects. Professor Dolores O'Riordan, Vice-President for Global Engagement, presented the certificates to all volunteers and went on to address the gathering, congratulating the volunteers on their achievements. Following the formalities there was a reception hosted by UCD Global with excellent music by the staff band.

The link between the SPHPSS and UCDVO offers an important opportunity for students across our programmes to gain valuable work experience while contributing to communities in developing countries.

Thank you to UCDVO staff Hilary Minch, Sorcha Lyne and Zoe Liston for the amazing work they do throughout the year preparing volunteers for travel, working with partners, and supporting volunteers during the projects. ## 13th International Symposium on Biological Monitoring

Assistant Professor Dr Alison Connolly and PhD candidate Darragh Doherty both attended the 13th International Symposium on Biological Monitoring (ISBM13) in occupational and environmental health, from September 9-12, 2025, in Milan, Italy. Dr Connolly presented on the work of the Human Biomonitoring for Ireland (HBM4IRE) research project, developing a framework for establishing an Irish human biomonitoring programme. An Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) report was recently published on this project.

Darragh Doherty, a PhD candidate within Dr Connolly's research group and working in the Conway Institute, also attended the conference and presented a poster on his research studies for the Neonicotinoid Insecticide Study. Darragh specifically presented on the exposure of the Irish population to neonicotinoid insecticides and their cellular toxicity, studied in vitro.

# Honorary Fellowship awarded by Royal College of Physicians to former UCD SPHPSS PhD Student





Visits were arranged for Airfield Estate, community home enteral feeding, neonatal unit, NMH, MMUH and Healthy UCD as well as time spent on reviewing curricula and placement policies and procedures, and potential collaborations with UCD Volunteers Overseas, offering great learning opportunities for all involved. Appreciation is expressed to the UCD Africa Engagement Seed Fund for funding our project on "Advancing Dietetics Training in Malawi: A UCD-LUANAR Knowledge Exchange Initiative". This visit follows from a successful ESTHER grant which recently culminated in publication of an article in BMC Geriatrics titled "Risk of malnutrition, food insecurity, dietary quality, and associated factors among Malawian older adults at hospital admission: a cross-sectional study".

### Advanced Research Methodology in Lausanne, Switzerland

As part of the Swiss-Irish Health Sciences Doctoral Programme, Catherine Fallon (PhD student) and two PhD students from the UCD School of Nursing, Midwifery and Health Systems travelled to Lausanne to participate in the Advanced Research Methodology course.

The programme, supported by a travel stipend, took place across two teaching blocks (30th June-2nd July and 28th-29th August 2025). The course was delivered by Professor Emmanuelle Opsommer, and seven other PhD and MSc students from physiotherapy, occupational therapy, dietetics, and nursing studying in Switzerland also took part.

Over the course of the sessions, a range of methodological approaches were covered: advanced statistical methods, Delphi design for consensus building, questionnaire development and validation and application of AI in health science research. This programme provided a valuable opportunity for cross-disciplinary and cultural exchange.

# Help Us Understand Chemical Exposure in Ireland's Population: Volunteers Needed for Ireland's Human Biomonitoring Study!

Have you ever wondered what chemicals you might be exposed to in your daily life, through the air you breathe, the food you eat, or the products you use? Researchers at UCD are inviting young adults aged 18–39 years to take part in a groundbreaking national study that aims to answer exactly that question.

Human biomonitoring (HBM) is considered the gold standard for assessing chemical exposure in populations by measuring chemicals and their metabolites directly in biological samples such as blood or urine.

The current study will help scientists understand how environmental chemicals are entering the bodies of people in Ireland and at what levels. By participating, you will play a vital role in shaping future environmental health policies and contribute to a healthier, safer Ireland. Building on the successful HBM4IRE feasibility study, which laid the foundation for developing a national Human Biomonitoring programme in Ireland, this 4 year study will provide valuable insights into real-life chemical exposures and help identify actions to protect public health by measuring ten groups of priority chemicals and their metabolites.

The HBM4IRE study is funded by the Environmental Protection Agency and co-funded by the Partnership for the Assessment of Risks from Chemicals, reflecting a strong national and European commitment to advancing environmental health research in Ireland.

September 2025.






#### PhD Student Conor White at ISCOS 2025 and NeuPSIG 2025

Physiotherapy PhD student Conor White attended the 9th International Congress in Neuropathic Pain in Berlin in September and the International Spinal Cord Society (ISCOS) ASM 2025 in Gothenburg in October.

Conor presented his doctoral research as part of the HRB funded ExSCIP project titled: "Robotic-assisted gait training for spinal cord injury neuropathic pain: A systematic review". This study provides the basis for the ongoing randomised feasibility trial exploring the feasibility of exoskeleton walking as a potential non-pharmacological treatment for people living with neuropathic pain after spinal cord injury. Conor's PhD is supervised by Associate Professor Olive Lennon and Professor Catherine Blake.



# **European Society for Clinical Nutrition and Metabolism 2025**

Anna Walsh presented her MSc in Clinical Nutrition and Dietetics dissertation project "Changes to Serum Lipids, BMI and Body Composition in Adults with Cystic Fibrosis (CF) on Elexacaftor/Tezacaftor/Ivacaftor (ETI): A Systematic Scoping Review" at the ESPEN (European Society for Clinical Nutrition and Metabolism) Conference in Prague in September. Some key findings from the research include:

- ✓ 90% of studies reported an increase in BMI after starting ETI, with over half showing statistically significant rises.
- Almost half of the studies measuring BMI within one year showed patients reaching the recommended CF BMI range (22–24.9 kg/m²).
- Fat mass and fat-free mass increased in several studies, though data on visceral and subcutaneous fat were limited.
- ♦ Significant increases were seen in total cholesterol (72%), LDL-C (80%), and HDL-C (56%), as well as in triglycerides and non-HDL markers.

These findings highlight the need for tailored monitoring, updated nutrition guidance, and standardised research to inform clinical guidelines and support long-term health outcomes for people with CF on ETI.


### **APPETITE Symposium IUNS-ICN, Paris, France**







The 'OptiMeth-CRPS methodological framework' has been published in <u>Pain Reports</u>.


The OptiMeth-CRPS methodological framework describes a range of strategies for optimising the planning, design, conduct and reporting of clinical trials for complex regional pain syndrome as a rare pain condition.

The framework was developed by an international group of experts with lived experience, research and clinical expertise and led by Dr Keith Smart. It was funded through an ERA-NET NEURON Joint Transnational Networking Group Call "Networking Groups on Chronic Pain".

# PhD Student Anna Quinn and Dr Katy Horner at European Geriatric Medicine Society Conference

Dr Laura-Anne Furlong attended the Footwear Biomechanics Group meeting at the Norwegian School of Sport Sciences, presenting some of her research in muscle and tendon mechanics during running. Her presentations focused on 'Evaluation of a surrogate method of estimating calcaneal insertion position during running and effects on calculated Achilles tendon mechanics' and 'The effects of cushioning on soft tissue energy during jogging and running'. She was a recipient of a Nike travel award to support attendance at the meeting, and was also invited to chair a podium session and assist with the student mentor programme.

Next stop was Stockholm for the five day ISB congress, where she was joined by Dr Muhammad Shahid. Stockholm certainly didn't disappoint, with the opening banquet held in the Stockholm City Hall – the venue of the Nobel Prize Banquet – and a stunning conference location right on the waterfront. Dr Furlong presented on 'A comparison of overground sprint kinematics of elite cerebral palsy and able-bodied athletes' in addition to session chairing. Dr. Shahid presented part of his current postdoctoral research with Prof. Brian Caulfield on 'Optimizing monocular camera perspectives for accurate 3D human pose estimation'.

A nice surprise on the final day was that a UCD SPHPSS graduate was the winner of the Carlo de Luca Emerging Scientist Award for excellence in early career research in motor control and electromyography. Dr David O'Reilly presented a keynote on 'Towards mechanistically insightful precision motor assessments: the network-information framework'; he graduated from the Sport & Exercise Management programme in 2016 prior to completing his PhD in computational neuroscience at University of Leeds, where he is currently based.
