Funding awarded for Teaching & Learning Projects



As UCD begins to implement its *Rising to the Future* strategy and allied Education Strategy, planning for the future based on what we are learning from the COVID-19 context, our commitment to digital transformation and providing for increasing domestic and international students, there is a significant policy gap with reference to the formalised provision of academic advice to our undergraduate and taught graduate students.

The need for such a policy is to ensure that all students are provided with high-quality academic support and advice through a proactive academic partnership with mutual expectations of faculty and students. At the request of the Registrar/Deputy President a university-wide working group has been established, under the Chair of Professor Marie Clarke, to inform university-wide policy on academic advising.

The initiative has a number of work strands; one of these strands is focused on piloting different approaches to academic advising across the University. As part of this initiative, 17 pilot projects from across all Colleges received funding after a very competitive process. The SPHPSS has had two projects funded through this process. Congratulations to both groups on achieving this funding.

UCD Global Engagement Seed Funding Grant

This summer, Dr Cliona O'Sullivan was successful in the UCD Global Engagement Seed Funding call for a project called 'Learning Partnerships for Global Health'; the specific goal of which is to codesign and develop high quality and inclusive online collaborative learning toolkits relating to Rehabilitation for Non-Communicable Disease. Their partner institution is Mbarara University of Science and Technology, (MUST), Uganda. The official university partnership was first made possible in 2016 via UCDVO networks and supported with seed funding from the Irish Forum for Global Health.



Irish Aid Fellowship Programme



The Irish Aid Fellowship programme enables students from developing countries to undertake full-time study at master's level at an Irish higher-level institution, with a focus on courses that are relevant to Irish Aid's development objectives. This year the MSc Advanced Physiotherapy Studies joins the Masters in Public Health (MPH) programme as an eligible programme for the Irish Aid Fellowship Scheme. More than 2,000 students have studied in Ireland over the past 45 years as part of this programme. UCD has hosted more Irish aid fellows than any other institute over the last 15 years, totaling more than 300 alumni.

Evidence Synthesis Ireland Fellowship

Assistant Professor, Dr Clare Reynolds, was recently awarded an Evidence Synthesis Ireland fellowship with Professor Robert Boyle (Cochrane Skin / Imperial College London) to conduct a network meta-analysis on anti-inflammatory treatments for atopic eczema.



The aim of this review is to systematically review and meta-analyse existing clinical trial evidence on the effectiveness and safety of different topical anti-inflammatory treatments for eczema. This review will use network meta-analysis in order to indirectly compare the effectiveness and safety of different classes of topical anti-inflammatory treatments. Healthy UCD Annual Report



The annual report from Healthy UCD, chaired by Professor Patricia Fitzpatrick, was published in August and details a new strategy to be developed over the next 5 years, which will be guided by national policy, including Healthy Ireland and the Healthy Campus Framework, and local identified needs. The report in particular recognised the challenge of maintaining and building on progress made towards a healthy university in a period where activity on campus was severely curtailed during the COVID-19 pandemic. Significant work was carried out by the Healthy UCD Steering Committee to ensure that a wide range of engaging activities in the areas of healthy eating, physical activity and mental wellbeing continue to be provided to the UCD community. SPHPSS IN THE OLYMPICS

The 2020 Tokyo Olympics saw the largest cohort of UCD Ad Astra alumni and students competing for Ireland across a number of events, including rugby 7's, rowing, hockey, swimming and sailing. Of the 21 athletes who qualified, five of these athletes were either alumni or a student of physiotherapy.

Fintan Ryan, Stage 1 Physiotherapy, Track Cycling



Fintan joined the Irish track cycling team as a reserve Madison for the 2020 Olympics. This year not only saw Fintan join his first Olympic team, but also, he joined the UCI Continental team EvoPro earlier this year. On the track, he previously competed for Ireland at Europeans in 2015 (Team Pursuit) and 2016 (Elimination event). Among his road titles, Fintan has the National Junior Road Race Champion (2013) and Irish Senior Criterium Champion (2019).

Paul O'Donovan, Graduated 2017, Rowing



The 2020 Olympics saw Paul's second time on the Olympic podium competing for Ireland in the Lightweight Men's Double Sculls. As a four-time world champion and five time European champion, Paul claimed gold at this years Olympics with his teammate Fintan McCarthy. He previously brought home a silver medal from the 2016 Olympics in Rio alongside his brother and teammate, Gary.

Sarah Lavin, Graduated 2018, 100m Hurdles



For her first Olympics, this high hurdle specialist represented Ireland in the 100m hurdles. Despite several injury setbacks in the year prior to the Games, the former European junior silver medalist (2013) had an impressive build up to the Olympics. She set six 60 hurdle PBs prior to the European Indoor Championships and recorded an outstanding PB for the 100m in Madrid in June of 12.95 secs just weeks prior to the Games, making her only the second Irish woman to break 13 seconds for the 100m. Although Sarah matched her second fastest time during the Olympic Heats of 13.16 seconds, she unfortunately finished 7th place and missed out on competing at the semi-finals.

Ciara Mageean, Graduated 2017, Athletics 1500m



As a two-time European champion (2016, 2019), the Irish indoor 1500m record holder, the first Irishwoman to break two minutes for 800m, the second Irish woman to reach a World Championship final and a Rio 2016 semi-finalist, Ciara was a strong contender entering Tokyo 2020. Despite clocking an impressive time of 4:02:48 a few weeks prior to the Games in Monaco, after tearing her calf in training 8 days prior to the Olympic Heats, Ciara unfortunately placed 11th in her heats (finishing time of 4:07:29).

Foster Horan, Graduated 2019, Rugby 7's



Foster is one the team's five so-called 'originals' who have been involved since Ireland's first Sevens squad was inaugurated in 2015. He has 11 caps for Ireland and served as the prop for the first ever Irish Rugby 7's team to qualify for the Olympics. The team were unfortunately beaten by Kenya in the group stages and finished 10th overall in the tournament.

Mark English, Studied Physiotherapy for 1 year, Graduated 2018 from Medicine, Athletics 800m



For the second consecutive Olympics, Mark represented team Ireland in the 800m race. Just weeks prior to the Games, this three-time European medalist and Rio 2016 semi-finalist became the Irish senior 800m record holder after breaking a record that had stood for 26 years with a time of 1:44:71. Unfortunately, despite clocking an impressive 1:46:75 in his heat (finishing in 4th position), Mark was just outside the top-three finish needed to progress to the semi-finals.



Projects, Marketing and Engagement Manager

The school is delighted to welcome Jenny Caffrey as Projects, Marketing and Engagement Manager. Jenny graduated from UCD with a BComm and MBS (Marketing) and has held a broad range of marketing and product management roles at a senior level in both Ireland and Australia. She joined the UCD School of Veterinary Medicine in May 2018 to help draft the School's submission for the Athena SWAN Bronze award and deliver the initiatives identified in its Athena SWAN Action Plan. In her new role, working with staff across SPHPSS, Jenny will lead the development of a communications strategy for the School and will guide marketing and promotion of all School activities including undergraduate and graduate programmes, summer conferences and courses, programmes nationally and internationally.



Postdoctoral Research Fellow

Niamh McGrath joined the School in October to work on the EndObesity Project, under the supervision of Dr Catherine Phillips. Niamh graduated from UCC with a Master of Applied Psychology (Mental Health) in 2016, was awarded the Ruth Curtis Early Care Researcher and Practitioner Award from the Psychological Society of Ireland, Division of Health Psychology in 2020 and completed her the SPHeRE Programme (Structured Population Health and Health-Services Research Education) PhD training at the School of Public Health, UCC in 2021. Her PhD research focused on distress and depression among people with type 2 diabetes. Niamh is interested in intervention development and evaluation, implementation science and behaviour change research in the areas of maternal health during pregnancy, childhood obesity and diabetes.

Associate Editor Appointment

Equality, Diversity and Inclusion news

Associate Professor Caitríona Cunningham has been appointed as one of seventeen University for ALL Faculty partners across UCD. This Faculty Partnership Programme is designed to support and accelerate the implementation of Universal Design for Learning (UDL) throughout the University.

Additionally, six SPHPSS staff members, alongside staff from multiple HEIs across Ireland, are currently undertaking their Digital Badge for Universal Design in Teaching and Learning. This digital badge is awarded by the National Forum for the Enhancement of Teaching and Learning and the education programme is co-led by UCD in collaboration with the Association for Higher Education Access & Disability (AHEAD). All staff engaged in teaching activity are encouraged to sign up to take this digital badge with the next programme running in Spring 2021.





European guidelines on breast cancer screening and diagnosis

Professor Patricia Fitzpatrick, full professor of epidemiology and biomedical statistics, is a continuing member on the Guidelines Development Group of the European Commission Initiative on Breast Cancer (ECIBC) which works on developing new guidelines for breast screening. Currently they are reviewing and updating guidelines where very new evidence has emerged.



The guidelines present the latest evidence available in the form of recommendations and good practice statements intended to optimise patient care. The recommendations contained in the guidelines primarily address women at average risk of breast cancer without increased risk due to genetic predisposition (mutations in BRCA1 and BRCA2), reproductive history or race and ethnicity. They also inform decision-making for women who are recalled for suspicious lesions or women with high breast density. 4 Women Health Webinars



Healthy UCD and Culture & Engagement have teamed-up to organise 4 topical health webinars especially for women, with follow up webinars planned for men also. This programme for employees, held over Zoom, will be hosted by an expert in the subject area and followed by a Q&A session.

Webinar topics include bone health across the lifespan, chaired by Assoc. Prof. Caitríona Cunningham will explain why looking after bone health is critical to build bone and slow down bone loss across the lifespan for both women and men. Osteoporosis is however more prevalent in women with an associated greater risk of fragility fracture. A webinar on the 8 signs and symptoms of breast cancer will also be available, run by Olivia Carpenter, Breast Cancer Ireland Outreach Coordinator and Patient Ambassador. The 4th of November will see a webinar on HPV and cancer hosted by Professor Patricia Fitzpatrick who will provide an update on the role of HPV in cancer development in women and men, the HPV vaccination programme for girls and boys and the potential for cancer elimination. PERSIST guidance for Exercise, Rehabilitation, Sport medicine and SporTs science

Professor Eamonn Delahunt recently authored/co-authored his 25th peer-reviewed article in the British Journal of Sports Medicine, which is the number 1 ranked journal in the Sport Sciences section of the Journal Citation Reports. The BJSM has an impact factor of 13.8. The article is titled: Implementing the 27 PRISMA 2020 Statement items for systematic reviews in the sport and exercise medicine, musculoskeletal rehabilitation and sports science fields: the PERSiST (implementing Prisma in Exercise, Rehabilitation, Sport medicine and SporTs science) guidance. This article aims to educate those in sport and exercise medicine, musculoskeletal rehabilitation and sports science fields on better systematic review reporting and allow reviewers and editors to accurately judge the quality of a systematic review. UCD professor to visit one of Germanys top 10 universities

Dr Ditroilo, Assistant Professor in Sport and Exercise Science in UCD and programme director of the UCD MSc Coaching Science in Sport, has been invited to visit Friedrich-Alexander University Erlangen-Nürnberg, one of the top 10 universities in Germany, during the month of October 2021. Massimiliano has been appointed visiting professor, with funding provided, by the Bavarian State Ministry of Science and the Arts.

This appointment will facilitate collaboration with Dr Alessandro Del Vecchio, who shares an interest in neuromuscular function in ageing and sport performance. This visiting professorship will see Dr Ditroilo delivering classes to local BSc and MSc students.





Centre for Food Safety Visiting PhD Student



Selene Rubiola is a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine and PhD student in Food Safety at the Department of Veterinary Sciences, University of Turin (Italy). She completed her bioinformatics training experience at the Centre for Food Safety, UCD as part of her postgraduate and international PhD training. Selene's research focused on the analysis of shotgun metagenomic data obtained from bulk tank milk filters from different farms, with the aim of describing the microbiome, resistome and mobilome of raw milk. Her work addresses the antimicrobial resistance threat through a next-generation and one health approach considering human, animal, and environmental reservoirs. Selene will submit her thesis by the end of the year and will graduate in the first half of 2022.

The inaugural lunchtime seminar took place on Friday, 1st October with excellent talks by Karen Ryan, Educational Technologist, on developing and running quizzes in Brightspace, and Dr Sarah Browne on peerScholar as an effective tool for peer assessment among dietetic students.

Professor Patricia Fitzpatrick was invited to speak at the 12th International Colorectal Disease conference "Women's Health and Colorectal Disease" in St Vincent's University Hospital on the 10th of September 2021 and presented on the topic of HPV and cancer.

In addition, Patricia was an invited speaker at the British Society of Cytology and Cervical Pathology Basic Colposcopy Course at the National Maternity Hospital, Holles St on the 8th October 2021, where she gave a presentation on strategies for prevention of cervical cancer.





Institute of Biomedical Science President's Prize



Fionn Sheridan has been awarded the Institute of Biomedical Science (IBMS) President's Prize for his excellent final year project thesis on the Molecular and Phenotypic Investigations to Assess Risk to Human Health associated with a Collection of Pseudomonas Aeruginosa of Clinical origin. The study, which was completed at the Centre for Food Safety, SPHPSS, UCD during Summer 2021, involved the assessment of antimicrobial susceptibility, biofilm formation and the detection of genomic features through the use of whole-genome sequencing and pan-genome analysis. Each year the prize is awarded to those who achieve academic distinction graduating from an IBM-accredited BSc. Hons programme. Fionn has been recently appointed as a biomedical scientist at the Department of Microbiology at the St Vincent's University Hospital following the completion of his BSc in Biomedical Science. - Advanced technologies to mitigate food safety risks.
- Linking Next Generation Sequencing (NGS)-based methods with risk assessment for food safety.
- Metagenomics and assessment of risk to human health.
- Metatranscriptomics and the active food environment.

Research, Impact and Innovation Committee

The Research, Innovation and Impact Committee are in the process of establishing a pilot of their Working Groups scheme and are looking for volunteers from across the school and for individuals at all levels and disciplines. - 2) Deputy will be identified in each group to coordinate
- 3) Identify a research activity (grant, review, seminar series etc.) to pursue as a group
- 4) The Research Innovation and Impact Committee will provide a 'roadmap' to aid discussion and promote research outcomes
